IT'S SPRING

We rejoice when folks make the decision to accept Jesus as their Savior. We celebrate decisions to enter full-time Christian vocations. We are deeply moved by signs of renewal in individuals and in congregations. We enjoy (and learn from) our pastors who return from continuing education and sabbatical experiences with fresh insights and perspectives.

Where are you seeing signs of new life? Are there signs in your own life? In the life of your family and friends? In your congregation? It's pretty obvious that there's no chance of anything growing if no seeds are planted. Perhaps it's time for you to carefully plant some seeds by sharing the joy of your faith with another. Perhaps it's time for you to follow a seed planter and offer encouragement. Gently surrounding seekers and new Christians with love will help them grow.

Mission Advocates in Partnership: Communicating Missions with Clarity

The ABC Nebraska Department of Mission is reactivating the Region's Mission Advocates in Partnership (MAP) program. Originally established in Nebraska by Rev. Don Gaines, the MAP program is designed to strengthen the understanding and funding of American Baptist mission by creating and sustaining a network of committed, enthusiastic, informed, local mission spokespersons who work in partnership with local church pastors and regional staff.

Mission Advocates have a special role to play in a culture that does not value mission. One reason that they are chosen to serve as Mission Advocates is that they have already shown an active interest in mission. They are motivated in part for the joy and excitement they experience as they enlist others in active support of mission. Mission education helps churches understand the importance of supporting mission. In their role as mission spokespersons, Mission Advocates encourage support for missionaries at home, across the region, throughout the nation, and around the world.



Mission Advocates in Partnership model, encourage, communicate, and ask for support of American Baptist mission, as they serve Christ through this important ministry. They represent different areas and functions of mission. For example, they represent their local congregation's mission in the wider mission of American Baptists. They represent the region and its many ministries. They represent the ministries of our national and general boards. They help bring Acts 1:8 to life in their communities, Nebraska, our country, and around the world.

Under Rev. Gaines' leadership, Mission Advocates were identified in many of our congregations around the region. The Department of Mission will be contacting our churches for help in identifying lay leaders to serve in this capacity. Those previously appointed will be given the opportunity to continue in service. If you would like to know more about serving in this capacity for your congregation, please let your pastor know of your interest.

Special training programs, conferences and retreats are planned to help equip the Mission Advocates to acquire the knowledge and skills necessary to serve effectively. From the national MAP handbook, the ministry of the Mission Advocates will include --

- Encourage and resource the local churches in hands-on mission involvement. Mission unites American Baptists.
- · Understand the missiology of American Baptist churches. Mission Advocates model an understanding that mission is who we are, as well as something we do.
- · Know the basic history of American Baptist mission. God brought together various streams of cultures to create a mighty, contemporary mission movement. American Baptists have a noble mission heritage that is ours to carry into a changing world.
- · Receive, read, and share information about American Baptist mission. Mission Advocates receive timely information and resources from the Minister of Mission Support so that they will be "in the loop."
- · Tell American Baptist mission stories. Some of the greatest successes in American Baptist mission go unreported. Mission Advocates can help report them by giving stories of their churches and community mission to region staff so they can teach mission and share examples in the American Baptist family.
- · Interpret United Mission. The Mission Advocate's knowledge of regional, national, and international ministries helps them tell their congregations how United Mission dollars are spent locally. They often are able to say, "This ministry is made possible by our congregation's support of United Mission."

Plan An ABC/NE Vacation!

Why not plan a unique vacation this year? What may seem a bit weird to some, could be great fun for others. What does an ABC/NE Vacation look like? The full version would include travel from north to south and east to west in Nebraska. Here are some elements you could put together to make an interesting trip:

- Visit the Sarpy County Museum. They have pictures of the Moses Merrill cabin and information about the earliest mission in Nebraska Territory.
- Make a project of finding the ABC/NE church windows that your family votes the best. Some candidates are FBC-Omaha, Second-Lincoln, FBC-Alliance, FBC-Broken Bow, FBC-Albion. Visit at least four and then cast your vote for the best by calling the region office.
- You could also compare church architecture or sanctuary design. [McCook may be the most unusual outside and FBC-Lincoln may be the most interesting sanctuary. You decide.]
- Visit Camp Moses Merrill near Linwood. [Be sure to experience the Prayer Walk.]
- Visit the site of the old Camp Merrill near Fullerton.
- Visit the burial place of Ola Hanson, Baptist missionary to the Kachins of Burma, in the cemetery in Oakland, NE.
- Worship in a church that's very different from your own.

Open country churches: Riverside-Decatur, Prairie Union-Stella, Palestine-St. Edwards, Fairhaven-Lexington. Call the church or the region office to get directions.

Other suggestions for you to consider: King Solomon Missionary Baptist-Omaha, FBC-Arthur, Strangers Rest Missionary Baptist-Bellevue, Guide Rock Baptist, or First Kachin-Omaha.

- Visit the ABC/NE Region Office in Omaha. [Perhaps not the most exciting part of the trip but we'd love to see you!]
- Get a copy of the region directory and plot out a trip to the churches that are furthest north, south, east and west in NE.

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ABC/NE Caravan Rolls Again

Pastor Seminar Focuses on Worship

ABC/NE pastors will gather May 2-4 at Camp Moses Merrill to study breakthrough ideas for transforming worship. The "Reinventing Sunday Seminar" is the spring ABC/NE Pastoral Leadership Seminar.

The seminar leader will be Rev. Brad Berglund. He has recently written a book on worship renewal called Reinventing Sunday. He works with church musicians, pastors and worship committees around the country focusing on transformative worship and congregational spiritual formation. Berglund is the worship designer for the Baptist World Alliance congress to be held in Birmingham, England in July. He has been a pastor, church musician and weekly worship leader for over 20 years.

ABC/NE Pastoral Leadership Seminars are funded by The Carpenter Fund. The Fund was established by a couple from Calvary Baptist in Omaha to provide support for pastoral education. Three seminars are held at Camp Moses Merrill in each two year period. Fees for ABC/NE pastors are paid by the fund

IN WEST VIRGINIA, AN ABC CHURCH-BASED FOOD PROGRAM HELPS MEET COMMUNITY NEED

A West Virginia ABC family was leaving a baseball game in Pittsburgh a year ago when a homeless person outside the stadium asked Valerie Kiser for the half empty bag of popcorn she was carrying. At first her 6-year old daughter Sophie was upset that her mom gave away the popcorn: She kept asking, "What does it mean to be homeless?" Valerie told her daughter that without the popcorn the man might have no food for dinner and could end up eating out of a garbage can. "What can we do?" Sophie asked. And--relentlessly--kept asking.

Then Valerie saw a magazine article about a school for homeless children that provided food boxes for students to take for dinner at night, and she adapted the idea as an answer to Sophie's question. Now, through Summersville Baptist Church's Project Multitude, Valerie puts together boxes of food for distribution to local Head Start families the third week of every month--when their food stamps have run out and the welfare checks are getting thin.

These food boxes provide breakfast, lunch, dinner and a snack--plus recipes, suggested menus and nutritional information--for the entire family for three days. Valerie also includes spiritual information such as Bible coloring sheets, Bible bookmarks and church program schedules. Members of Summersville Baptist Church support Project Multitude by donating food,

and dollars to buy food, for the boxes. Valerie fills the boxes and bags, and Sophie helps by shopping and delivering food to families.

Valerie says when Sophie heard her talk about how she felt too busy to make time to listen to God, her daughter told her, in a child's simplicity: "Do you know what I do when I'm disobedient to the Lord? I pretend I'm Jonah, I've run from him, and I'm in that whale. I hunker down and listen."

For weeks after that Pittsburgh trip, Valerie says, Sophie talked about "doing something" to help the homeless, but "I kept putting her off. ...I truly believe that it was Sophie's innocence, her willingness to listen to the Lord, that led our family on this path." Finally, "I hunkered down and listened!" Mom says. "Praise God for reaching my family."

"I think God speaks to many of us, every day," says Valerie, "but we aren't 'hunkered down.' ...It's just a matter of looking around your community and finding need." And--perhaps-listening for God's voice in the most unusual places.

Summersville Baptist Church is an example of the many American Baptist congregations across the country helping to vitalize a multitude of caring ministries--one of the goals of NEW LIFE 2010, a vision of American Baptist Churches USA supported by National Ministries.

An Opportunity for Laity to Take a Look At: The Covenant and Code of Ethics For Ministerial Leaders of American Baptist Churches

Over the next several editions of the Messenger, I want to look at the Covenant and Code of Ethics. This is an agreement among American Baptist clergy that guides us as we do ministry. This is an important document for congregations to understand.

It begins: "Having accepted God's call to leadership in Christ's Church, I covenant with God to serve Christ and the Church with God's help, to deepen my obedience to the Two Great Commandments: to love the Lord our God with all my heart, soul, mind and strength, and to love my neighbor as myself."

There are several important affirmations here:

Pastoral leadership is in response to the call of God. In the process of searching for a new pastor, churches are seeking to discern God's will for leadership for the congregation. It is not just a matter of looking for a pastor with all the right skills, who will work for the budgeted amount of money, but

rather, of figuring out who God is calling to serve.

- The Church belongs to Christ: It is important for us to remember that the church doesn't belong to us. Christ is the head.
- The agreement to serve a church is a covenant between God and the pastor. It's much like a marriage covenant. The pastor is accountable to God to be faithful in his or her ministry to the church, just as a couple is called to be faithful to their marriage vows.
- The call is not static. It is not the case that the church is calling someone who "has it all together." Instead the pastor is called to grow in love for God and for God's people.

So the covenant and code of ethics is designed to help pastors who have been called by God to serve Christ's church. These pastors are accountable to God for their service, and are primarily called to deepen their love for God and for the people God has entrusted to them.
