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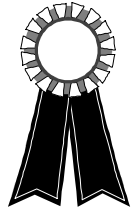

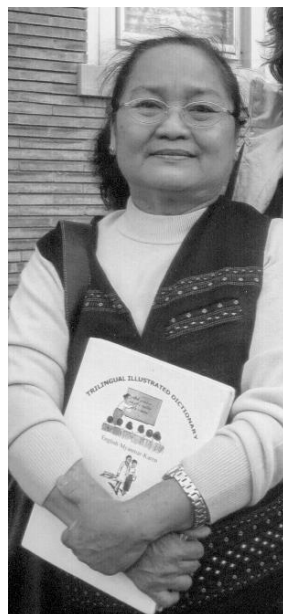

Karen Leader Begins Work With ABC/NE



Htoo May, a Karen refugee living in Omaha, has begun a unique transition ministry to help people adjust to life in this country. Working as an ABC/NE adjunct staff person, Htoo May will serve as Director of the National Karen Christian Women's Organization. She will travel throughout the country, establishing women's groups and teaching. Financial support for this ministry is coming through the ABC Burmese Task Force, which includes National Ministries, International Ministries and the Office of the General Secretary. Funding will also come from individual contributors in the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship.

Virginia Holmstrom, National Executive Director of American Baptist Women's Ministries, has been encouraging this action. She stated, "I am delighted that the ABC of Nebraska is coming alongside Htoo May in this exciting ministry partnership."

ABC/NE Executive Minister **Susan Gillies** said, "Htoo May is a blessing. Through her work, we can all have a part in assisting Karen women to make a healthy and spiritually sound transition to life in the United States."

ABC of Nebraska women will have the opportunity to meet Htoo May at their conference at Moses Merrill Camp & Conference Center, June 6-8.

The Hands & Feet of Jesus

A number of years ago, I directed a program at ABC called Ministry of the Laity in the Workplace. At that time, a retired oil company executive gave me an advertisement he found in a magazine. [He actually had the ad beautifully framed for me. It hangs today in my office at home.] That ad was a tribute from a company to its workers. The company was deeply grateful for the workers and formed its "thanks" into a tribute to the hands of the workers.

Hands are a powerful symbol of work. You may remember the old verse that included . . . "Christ has no hands but our hands to do his work today. He has no feet but our feet to lead men in his way."

ABC General Secretary Roy Medley has called American Baptists to be the hands and feet of Jesus.

ABC-USA President Mary Armacost Hulst writes: American Baptists "are seeking to serve the world as Christ's hands and feet. We are seeking to make God's love tangible, concrete and transformative. We are at a new time and place in our denominational history. We are in a time when we dare not turn inward in self-preservation, but we must have

a vision outward for transformation. Even in a time in history when denominations no longer have the authority and financial power that they once did, the world needs what American Baptists stand for and bring. The world needs our example of mission, diversity, freedom, and inclusive love. If we are to be the hands and feet of Christ then we must have strong ligaments. I was interested in the recent discovery that the words ligament and religion have the same root word. The root word carries the meaning of being bound together. Religion should bind people together in their quest for God. It is my prayer that . . . we will indeed be bound together by Christ and that we will have strong ligaments of love which will be limber enough to stretch and unite us so that we might get on with loving the world."

Our hands and feet will tell the story. How we live our daily lives, how we do our work, how we play, how we interact with others, how we handle conflict, all of these will bear witness to our faith.

Be gentle with yourself. Think of your hands and feet and how they represent Christ's presence in your world.

Attending to the Greats among us

Recently I have had the opportunity in my capacity as the national evangelism associate for Nebraska to provide training in several of our region's churches. The "Got Style?" material that emphasizes a natural and relational approach to evangelism taking personality styles into account was recently highlighted in the America For Christ offering literature. While it is primarily viewed as an evangelism program, it acknowledges the holistic ministry of the church and the ways that evangelism can be done effectively in the context of caring ministries.

One of the components of that material is a chart that allows a congregation to identify the tasks and programs that it sponsors and to assign each of them to one of the three ministry foci that we refer to as "the greats." A good (great?) summary of what we mean by "the greats" is provided by Dr. Jeff Johnson, ABC-USA's National Ministries' NET Strategist/Evangelism Specialist, who uses this statement in his email signature, "*Striving to be found faithful to the Great Commission (Matthew 28), the Great Commandment (John 13), and the Great Community (1 Peter 4), in accordance with the Great Criteria (Matthew 25) of the least, the last, and the lost.*"

The Great Commission is primarily understood at dealing with evangelism; preaching the gospel, baptizing, making disciples.

The Great Commandment tells us to love God and to love our neighbors as ourselves.

The Great Community refers to the body of Christ and to the use of our gifts in ministering to one another.

Each of these three "greats" is understood to be carried out unconditionally and without prejudice according to the Great Criteria, which is seen in Jesus' blessing on those who minister to the hungry, the thirsty, the naked, the stranger, the sick, and the prisoner.

In addition to those programs and tasks in which our local churches are involved, our four seasonal offerings allow us to further target each of these "greats" in direct and concrete ways. I received a call this morning from one of our members who wanted to know how she could participate in our ABC efforts to aid those affected by the recent storms in Myanmar and the earthquakes in China. She wanted to love her neighbors on the other side of the globe and knew from experience that the men and women that we have ministering in those areas on our behalf as the hands and feet of Jesus would use her contributions wisely and effectively. For her, the *One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS)* offering could not have come at a more opportune time. Although some of the monies received in the *America for Christ* and *World Mission Offering* collections are used by National Ministries and International Ministries for disaster relief, it is the primary purpose of the *OGHS* to alleviate the sufferings caused by natural and man-made catastrophes.

When we attend to the greats, we are the hands and feet of Jesus.

Take five ideas for promoting Bible reading:

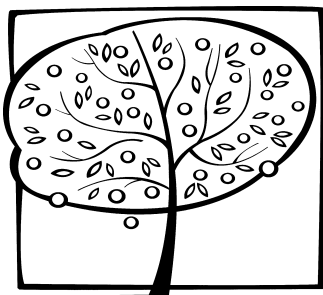
1. Use from standardized lists--see *Journeys* or *The Secret Place*.

Good Soil Project Winds Up Two-Year Process With Success

Several years ago, Associate Executive Minister Dave Lundholm applied for and received a Clark Grant from ABC's National Ministries. The grants were designed to help small churches in small communities. Ten churches were invited to participate. Teams from each church met with the other teams three times each year for two years. National and regional leaders led the sessions on a variety of topics helpful in church vitality. Different styles of worship were experienced under the leadership of Kip Mickelson of Omaha First. The model for the process came from earlier experimental projects.

The degree of success each church had was directly related to how much the team was able to engage the congregation in participating in the home work. Last month's Messenger had the story of the dramatic growth at FBC Albion in terms of numbers of baptisms, attendance, mission giving and general vitality of the congregation.

The official finale of Good Soil will be June 21 at Grand Island. There is the possibility participating churches may want to continue in some way and recruit additional churches.

Volunteers Continue to be Needed on Gulf Coast Recovery Still In Process

American Baptists from all parts of the country continue to respond to on-going needs on the Gulf coast. Recovery efforts are still underway two years following the devastation of Hurricane Katrina.

More than 200 volunteers signed on to help build 11 houses for 11 deserving families on the Gulf Coast in the 2008 Blitz Build in Baton Rouge, La., April 28 – May 17. The Blitz Build involved the combined forces of ABC and other Baptist groups along with Habitat for Humanity.

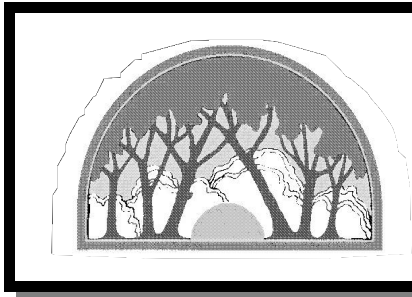
Dr. Aidsand Wright-Riggins, Executive Director of ABC's National Ministries, speaking in Nebraska the day after the wrap-up of the Blitz Build, urged volunteers to continue to respond. He also expressed his hope that work can be done on rebuilding some of the destroyed churches.

Check www.nationalministries.org to read stories and personal testimonies from the Blitz Build — and to follow further progress with rebuilding.

NEBRASKA CONNECTION: Jim McLennan of Benson Baptist, Omaha, has served three times in construction projects in the Pas Christian, Mississippi area. Jim points out there is still great need for volunteers, "Even this long after the storms, people are just getting started at permanent rebuilding." He adds that some people have just gotten insurance or grant money to rebuild. "I've felt the joy of being able to help" he said and he is encouraging others to participate.

Long-Term Pastorates

This fall I will finish my 17th year of service to ABC-NE. That is a long time but there are others serving or having served as senior pastors that have longer tenure than that. Pastor Al Wagstaff has been at King Solomon Missionary Baptist Church for 23 years, Pastor Jim Rowe served Scottsbluff for about 26 years, and Pastor Stan Murdoch has led First Baptist of Kearney for about 21 years. I asked them to help me out as I thought about long pastorates.

Stan shares an advantage of enhanced trust. "Trust is built over time and the sharing of experiences of life and faith ... It perhaps could be compared to a long term marriage, where you help each other walk through new chapters of life."

One of the advantages that I have noticed is that a long tenure gives a baseline to enable me to better interpret things that come up. For example, if a given church has a particular kind of crisis every few years, the first time I experience it, it is remarkable and I may over-react. But if I know that this kind of thing happens in that church every 3 to 5 years and this is the 5th time I've seen it, my tendency is to respond more calmly and with greater wisdom.

From the responses of Al, Jim and Stan, I can see some clear attitudes and wisdom that have enabled their long ministries.

Al: "...It has been a joy to lead the Lord's people...it's only through the enabling power of Jesus Christ that I have been able to carry on.." "Walk ahead of the people, and take some of the elders with you." "...seek the leadership of the Holy Spirit, and

place the burden of leading God's people on Him," and "We, as a people (ABC) will get to the Promised land."

Jim: "When we accept a call to a church, we should plan as if we would be staying forever;" "Our #1 goal during the first years was to build a close concerned fellowship and at the same time develop lay leadership;" and "Unless the ministry continues to be open, vibrant and fresh, the work can become mundane and stale."

Stan shares the joy of performing a wedding today for a girl that was two years old when he came to serve the church. One of the greatest "landmines" is being hurt. The temptation is to leave when the hurt begins but "if you don't work through the hurts, you never experience the miracles and joys that come over time...we need to remember the importance of ... forgiveness and forbearing with one another. Another landmine is becoming stagnant."

So to achieve a long tenure the necessary attributes are: joy, being a leader, seeking God, placing the burdens on God, being committed to a long pastorate, building fellowship and lay leadership, working through (not escaping from) hurts, and importantly keeping fresh through life long learning.

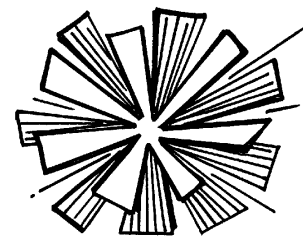
