Camp Construction Continues

Construction continues at Camp Moses Merrill as the vision of the camp becoming a true Center for Christian Growth comes into focus.

Construction workers are planning to complete work in May on the addition to Friendship Chapel that includes the Ward Conference Room, restrooms, kitchen, office and reception area. The camp is already receiving inquiries about use of the new facility.

The ABC/NE Board, meeting Sat. Feb 12, gave the "go ahead" for the Building Bridges gift from Calvary Baptist Church



to fund construction of the shell of a motel-style lodging facility. Individuals and churches may then provide funding to complete each of the 11 rooms. Each room, when completed, will have a queen and a twin bed and private bath.

NEEDS - GIFTS - MATCHMAKER

What do these words have in common? They are part of a new initiative for our ABC region. As part of the New Life 2010 program we are thinking of ways we can revitalize our churches. God used a work session in Milwaukee to lead our Executive Minister Susan and me to some almost identical ideas, while working independently from each other. As we shared ideas and realized what had happened I thought, "this is what Henry Blackaby means in *Experiencing God* when he says 'look around, find out where God is at work and then join Him' "

We are excited to do that in an initiative we have dubbed, **"Churches Helping Churches"**. We are convinced that each of our churches has some unique gifts and that we also have some needs. We believe that, in many cases, the region can be the "matchmaker" bringing together the gifts and the needs for the furtherance of ministry.

Needs (and gifts) can come in a variety of packages. We want to come to your church and visit about this program and see what we uncover together. Physical needs (like building needs) program needs (maybe VBS, small groups, youth, etc.) or resources (videos, materials, etc.) are perhaps some of the things we will find.

The region board endorsed the idea at the February meeting and we will now begin to work toward implementation. Stay tuned for more information, but in the meantime begin to think about your church. What gifts could you share with another? What could someone share with you?

Talking Money

I keep thinking about what Bob Roberts said at the 2004 ABC/NE Family Reunion. He said we don't want to talk about money because many of us have made a "god" of it. It's sacred. It's more important to us than most other things. The minute the pastor mentions money, we start to get upset. Why? We aren't bothered nearly so much by talk about our time and talents. We don't want the pastor to even mention money because we think of it as ours rather than a trust from God.



I' ve been defensive about money talk myself. I always used to get upset by the United Way telling me to give my "fair share." How in the world did they know what my "fair share"

I think we should talk about money. I think churches should have workshops and clinics about how to get out of debt, smart financial management, financial planning, etc. I know pastors who have extensive information on credit counseling services available for members. There is a big church on

the east coast that actually helps members get out of debt and stay out of debt. How much money do you spend on interest beyond house payments in a year's time? What else could you use that money for? Churches that assist members with financial planning usually see an increase in giv-



When I talk about debt, I'm not picking on a family surprised by medical expenses, burdened with unexpected home or car repair or other extraordinary needs. I'm talking about once that debt has started on the credit card how easy it is to add this and that non-essential item. Pretty soon we only care about the minimum payment. We don't even realize that we will end up paying many times the value of the purchased items. Today It is not unusual for folks to carry credit card balances that will take 30 years or more to pay off even if they do not add one more purchase in those 30 years.

We are stewards of all God's gifts to us. A steward is an individual charged with responsibility for management. How will we manage God's gifts? This seems like a topic that belongs in church.

How America For Christ ministers to the least, the last, and the lost

While news reports most often deal with single mothers, more and more single parent families are headed by men. That became a harsh reality recently at the Edna Martin Christian Center (EMCC)--one of more than 20 Neighborhood Action Centers in mission partnership with National Ministries--in Indianapolis, Ind. The center also is affiliated with the American Baptist regions of Indianapolis and Indiana/Kentucky.

A minister in the neighborhood called about a young man requesting help for himself and his two small children. The children's mother had left them with a neighbor without word if or when she would return.

The father assumed care of the children, but childcare problems caused him to lose his job, and the family was evicted because he could not pay the rent. At the time he went to the church, he and the children were sleeping in the park. The father feared his children would be taken away since he could not provide housing, so he had been reluctant to ask for assistance. Concerns about his children's health in cooler weather, however, forced him to the church.

Evonne Brown, outreach counselor at EMCC, immediately went to work following the pastor's call. Because the father had no income, securing housing was nearly impossible. Through cooperation with the church, however, See Page 4 for details a landlord was convinced to allow the family to move immediately into a furnished apartment

while EMCC worked to help this young man become self-sufficient.

EMCC's Outreach Center assisted with one month's rent through federal government funds, and the center's pantry helped with food until the paperwork was completed for food stamps and financial assistance through the local Department of Family and Children.

about this year's America For Christ Offering Challenge

In cooperation with other agencies, EMCC helped family members obtain clothing, since all of their possessions were lost when they were evicted. The Outreach Center also provided assistance to the father to apply for childcare, which allowed him to return to work. With EMCC's guidance--and the help of a neighborhood pastor and other agencies-this family has weathered its storm and become self-sufficient.

Brown says, "We are grateful that we were able to live out the mission of Edna Martin Christian Center and assist in moving this family from hopelessness to a vision of hope."

The Edna Martin Christian Center serves a neighborhood that struggles with underemployment, unemployment, poverty and drugs: Fewer than one half of adults have a high school education, and one third of families live below the poverty line.

Executive Director Dr. Lawrence Lindley, a commissioned American Baptist home missionary, says the words of Isaiah 58:7-8 encourage him in his work: "Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them... Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly."

Would You Like to Grow Your Church?

Most folks would like to see their church grow . . . whether that growth is in wisdom, in spiritual depth or in the number of members.

Recent research shows that there is one reason most people begin to attend a church. This one reason scores much, much higher than any other reason. More than advertising, more than a call from the pastor, more than an attractive building. What is it? **Most people begin to attend a church because someone they know invites them.**

Common excuses for not inviting people to church:

- I don't know anyone who doesn't already attend a church. Don't look past the person who cuts your hair, a neighbor, someone in a club or class with you, your letter carrier.
- I don't want to be overbearing or pushy. We don't hesitate to tell folks about a great restaurant we've found and it never occurs to us that this is pushy. You don't have to be pushy. You are simply telling someone about something you really enjoy that you think they might enjoy too.
- I'd be embarrassed if they said, "No." Keep a positive spirit. They may say "no" but they may be touched by your interest. The seed will be planted.
- I don't have the gift of evangelism or hospitality. Inviting someone to your church for worship or for a special event is a simple invitation. Anyone can do it.
- I'm afraid they won't like my church. You need to do some serious thinking. Why wouldn't they like it? Is there anything you can do to help your church to be a more welcoming place? Many people are looking for authenticity in a church more than show business.



The simple truth is that inviting folks to church is primarily the responsibility of the laity. Like most things, you improve with practice.

Challenge yourself to invite someone to Easter services at your church.

ABC-USA BIENNIAL -- Two Nebraska youth will participate in the Biennial as representatives of ABC/NE. Nominations are due to the Omaha office no later than March 11.

Nebraskan Experiences Kodiak

Stephen Foreman, Fremont, spent last summer as an American Baptist Volunteer-In-Mission at Kodiak Baptist Mission (KBM) in Alaska. Here are some of his reflections: "I think the most meaningful times during my 11-week stay were with the 7th and 8th graders. One of my jobs at the mission was to facilitate middle-schoolers in a contemporary bible study called mentor-

group. The purpose of mentor group was to discuss, learn, and challenge one another in our faith while maintaining a positive, Christ-centered, atmosphere. From this basic framework I was blessed with the most rewarding summer of my life. My experience at Kodiak Baptist Mission strengthened my personal relationship with Jesus Christ, made me a strong advocate for KBM's unique type of ministry, and gave me memories to last a lifetime. Memories that have quickly become great stories..."

Stephen remembers one experience in particular: "On this particular day three counselors (including me), a resident mission expert, and 10 adolescents were packing up for a three day, two night back-packing trip into the back

> country of Kodiak Island. Necessities were doublechecked: food, water, extra

socks, bibles, and even pepper spray, in the unlikely event of a bear attack. The van was cramped with bodies and backpacks for the ride into the interior of Kodiak. Upon arrival, our hiking immediately commenced. My head seemed to be on a swivel as I took in the vast landscape from every direction. Finally, fatigue set in and we rested. This stop, like every stop, was used as a time for resting our physical bodies and feeding our spiritual through readings from the Bible. At the first camp-site the girl campers were quick to regain energy and engage in conversation that left them giggling into the night. Unfortunately, their fun ended abruptly after an accidental discharge of the concentrated pepper spray. Although pepper spray can be used effectively to deter an attacking bear, the ironic thing is that the smell of the spray, once released,




will actually attract them! Needless to say, we packed up and found a new camp-site where we slept safe and sound..well, at least safe. Over the course of the trip the campers slowly lost inhibitions towards one another and began to opening up during the Bible readings and discussions. Finally, while atop a flat peak rising just above low-lying clouds, the journey climaxed. In that final evening Bible study, Christ's love and plan of salvation was presented. With tears in her eyes, a young girl came forward and accepted Jesus Christ as her personal Savior. To this day, her transformation in mind and spirit matures with the help of the Kodiak Baptist Mission. As the mission has the privilege of witnessing and spiritually nurturing to their unique island community, American Baptist Churches have an equally unique privilege of supporting this ministry. KBM and American Baptist Churches share a partnership designed and ordained to fulfill the Great Commission!"

We are delighted to report that Stephen will return to Kodiak for the summer of 2005. He has found that this ABC mission

site is a beacon of light for an entire island community. Stephen is passionately involved in raising money for a new van for the mission. SHARE CHRIST WITH AMERICA

The Mission Department of the ABC of Nebraska announced at the February Region Board meeting this year's America For Christ Offering challenge. Because it seeks to honor both those churches which are able to contribute significantly to the Region's total gift, as well as those churches which have a large percentage of its membership participate in the offering, the department has created two categories in which a church can earn the Nebraska Champions for America For Christ designation.

The five churches with the highest total gift to the America For Christ Offering and the five churches with the highest per capita average (based on average worship attendance) will be declared Nebraska Champions for America For Christ. Churches achieving top-five placement on both lists will be designated Grand Champions for 2005.

Three members from the top church in each category will be invited to participate in an all-expense-paid trip to Kansas City to visit the Bethel Neighborhood Center, one of the ministries that is funded by the America For Christ Offering, and to meet its new Executive Director, Rev. Lisa Harris.

The Mission Department noted that ABC Nebraska churches were able to increase their giving to the World Mission Offering last fall by an average of over 23% and expressed confidence that our churches would be generous in funding mission and ministry in our own backyard.
