Speakers Announced For ABC/NE Family Reunion



Rev. Eddie Cruz

Rev. Eddie Cruz will be the keynote speaker for the ABC/NE Family Reunion (annual convention) September 18-20. Cruz is Assoc. Exec. Director for Mission Interpretation and Development for ABC's National Ministries.

Born and raised in Chicago, Cruz is well acquainted with that city's mean streets. Even as a youth, he had the gift of leadership, but he was leading in the wrong direction as leader of a gang. God directed his steps, and, at 17, he walked into North Shore Spanish Baptist Church. There he met and was inspired by the words of Rev. Modesto Lopez, a man who, to this day, remains one of his heroes. "It was a transformational moment in my life, and I made the decision to change. It was difficult because there are always people in your life who don't want you to change," he says. "I faltered at times, but little by little, Christ kept stripping away the old

me." Rev. Cruz graduated from Judson College and Northern Baptist Seminary.

Duane Binkley will also speak at the Family Reunion. Duane and his wife, Marcia, serve Burmese ethnic Karen and Chin refugees both in the United States and Thailand. The Binkleys work with the tens of thousands of refugees coming to the U.S. while continuing to work with those still remaining in refugee camps along the Thai-Myanmar (Burma) border.

Duane has been working with ABC of Nebraska in helping connect with Karen refugees living in Nebraska. Currently Karen people are worshipping at both First Baptist Omaha and First Baptist Lincoln. The Omaha group has requested recognition as an ABC congregation.

The ABC/NE Family Reunion will be held at the Holiday Inn Convention Center in Kearney. The theme of the convention is "The Joy of the Lord."

Pastors Invited to Tri-Region Event

“Leaders Who Last”

ABC Pastors in Nebraska, the Dakotas and Mid-America (MN, IA) will gather in Sioux Falls, SD, April 20-22. The reason is the Tri-Region Pastors Continuing Education Event. This year's theme is: *Leaders Who Last: Sustaining Yourself and Your Ministry.*”

Speakers include Margaret Marcuson and Dr. David May. An ABC pastor, Marcuson speaks and writes on leadership and works with faith leaders nationally as a consultant/coach through her company Marcuson Leadership Circle, based in Portland, Oregon. David May has taught at Central Baptist Theological Seminary since 1994. He also serves as an Adjunct Doctoral faculty member for the Univ. of Missouri-Kansas City interdisciplinary program in Religion. He has distinguished himself as a popular speaker, Bible teacher, and preacher.

Kachin People From Across the USA Gather at Moses Merrill

Memorial Day Weekend, Moses Merrill Camp & Conference Center will host a gathering of Kachin people from across the country. The First Kachin Baptist Church of America in Omaha will host this 13th Kachin Christian Family Camp. It is the second time the camp has been held at Moses Merrill.

During the weekend, the group will travel to Oakland, NE, to honor missionary Ola Hanson. Dr. Hanson and his wife served the Kachin people for 40 years. The Hansons are buried in the Oakland cemetery. The Kachin people will replace the grave marker on the Hanson gravesite with a new marker incorporating Kachin symbols. The dedication service at the Oakland Cemetery will take place at 3pm Saturday afternoon.

Executive Minister Susan Gillies reports the first time she met Kachin Pastor Gam Lahpai, he told her the grave marker for Ola Hanson was not adequate. “He explained that the Kachins would raise money to erect a more fitting memorial for the man who gave the Kachins an alphabet and translated the scriptures for them.”

Karen Church Leaders Request Affiliation with ABC/NE

Large numbers of Karen people have settled in Omaha and Lincoln. Karens are another Burmese tribal group from a different part of Burma from the Kachins. The group currently worshipping at FBC, Omaha, have requested recognition as an ABC congregation. The name of the church is American Baptist Karen Congregation. They will be welcomed into the family at the Family Reunion in September.

Riverside Names Pastor Emeritus

The congregation of Riverside Baptist Church voted to make the Rev. Harland T. Minscer Pastor Emeritus. A formal presentation and reception was held in February.

Pastor Beverly Melchor-Young approach the region with questions about how to establish a pastor emeritus. Following discussions, the church took the necessary action.

Rev. Minscer has completed a number of Interim Pastor assignments and will probably continue that work. But when he is "home" he will be at Riverside.

What Is a Pastor Emeritus?

Generally, a pastor emeritus is a retired pastor who is honored with this title after having served a congregation for at least 10 years. Often the pastor will have been retired and away from the church for 5 years before the honor is bestowed. The title is honorary and does not include specific expectations. Because each case is unique, Region staff can assist a church thinking about taking this action. There are many variations on this practice. It is good to have a letter of understanding between the pastor emeritus and the church. Again, Region staff can assist.

NATIONAL MINISTRIES CALLS ABC FAMILY TO JOIN IN 'MOBILIZATION TO END POVERTY'

Thousands of Christians will gather April 26-29 in Washington, D.C., to raise awareness about poverty. Hosted by Sojourners, the "Mobilization to End Poverty" represents one of the largest anti-poverty coalitions today: Lead sponsors include Convoy of Hope, ONE, Wesley Theological Society, World Vision and National Ministries, American Baptist Churches USA. National Ministries invites American Baptists across the country to join in this historic effort.

Participants will share in education, worship, community and activism, meeting with Congressional leaders and learning how to be more effective locally. National Ministries "boldly joins arms" with other lead partners in this movement, says Executive Director Dr. Aidsand F. Wright-Riggins III. 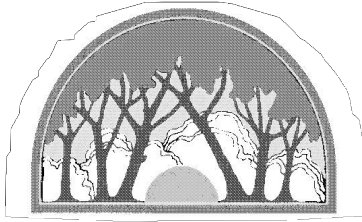

Summer 2009 at Moses Merrill Will Be Awesome!

At Moses Merrill Camp & Conference Center, the highlight of the year is the summer camping program for children and youth. Weeklong camps are offered for all age groups: Junior (grades 4-6), Middle High (grades 7-9), and Senior High (grades 10-12). Also offered are two Music & Drama (MAD) Camps.

I Lost My Job...Does God Still Love Me?

I haven't told this story to many people. I think it's time to tell it now. When I graduated from UNO in 1971 my career path was clear. My life work was to be an Air Force officer. I was commissioned as a second lieutenant and was promoted to first lieutenant eighteen months later. I was right on track for my future. Then in 1975, I was notified that as part of the reduction in force at the end of the Vietnam War my services were no longer needed. I had not only lost my job but my career, my future.

I was in total panic. I thought about going back to UNO to complete a graduate degree in psychology but every time my thoughts turned to that direction I was frozen just as if I was having some kind of anxiety attack. I thought about applying for a civil service job in personnel (the same kind of job I was doing in the Air Force) but when I did once again, panic.

I was stuck so I went to talk to my pastor. After I explained my situation, the first words out of his mouth were "Have you ever considered the ministry?" I responded "No," and that was (I thought) the end of the conversation.

Over the ensuing weeks, when I thought of UNO, I panicked. When I thought of civil service, I panicked. But when I thought of ministry, absolute peace came. For me, the loss of my job meant the beginning of a life-work of ministry. For me, the loss of my job was an expression of God's love to me guiding me to a much better and rewarding life than I could ever have imagined.

So I believe that if you have lost your job, God loves you so much that God will guide you to a future that is much better than the one you had in mind.

In John 10:10 Jesus says "...I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full." We can trust that promise even when we've lost our job.



Christian Camping . . .

It's Important . . . to YOU!

Nowadays, there are all kinds of camps. A child or young person can attend day camp, week-long camp, all-summer camp. They can go to basketball camp, computer camp, Y-camp, biology camp, math camp, arts camp, etc. Many of these are terrific experiences. But they are not substitutes for Christian camps like Camp Merrill.

At camp many years ago we were asked at a camp fire to listen for the call of God to "full time Christian Service". I answered that call not having a clue that it would mean serving as Pastor in an ABC church in Nebraska. I never had the opportunity to go to camp as a child. When I was in my 30's a former youth minister at my church asked me to go as a cabin leader. I told him I didn't even know what I could do there when I'd never been as a youth. He encouraged me and said I would do great. I said yes and learned how to lean on God to get me through things and deal with children in a positive manner. It taught me Philippians 4:13. When things get tough in any situation, I know I can rely on him to get me through it. I fell in love with the camping experience and believe every person young and old should have the experience.

LOCAL CHURCH NEWS . . . Featuring four ABC/NE churches

Benson Baptist Church Omaha, NE

Benson Baptist Church is a leading teaching church and the third largest American Baptist Church in Nebraska. It is located in the Benson area of Omaha.

The church was started by Christine Johnson as a Sunday School outreach in Benson.

Rev. Paul Marine has been pastor since 1996. He is also music director. Assistant Pastor Josh Klein began in 2008.

Benson Baptist is a leader in mission. **In 2008 it gave more than any other ABC/NE church to United Mission.** While, at the same time, it responded to multiple opportunities for mission on its own doorstep. The church operates a food pantry which serves over 200 families. The church also encourages members to find their own ministry in daily life. Several members are engaged in specific mission work.

Every Sunday at Benson, there are two worship services in English and one in Nuer for Sudanese immigrants. The church encourages a sister church in Nasir, Sudan.

The congregation puts great energy into children's ministry and senior's ministry . . . "and everything in between!"

Each year the church holds a Mission Fair. The Family Life Center is filled with displays and exhibits so that new (and old) members can learn about the variety of ministry opportunities and decide where they can join in.

The church is strongly committed to being the "hands & feet of Jesus" in both outside and inside the church.

Palestine Baptist Church St. Edwards, NE

The Church with A HEART FOR MISSION & LOVE TO SHARE:

That's what region staff think when they think of Palestine Baptist Church. This small church is one of three "open country" churches in the ABC of Nebraska. Located near St. Edwards, NE, the church building sits on a hill midst corn fields. Pastor Carl Edwards has served the church for over 11 years.

A special quality of this small congregation is that they are committed to the wider mission of Christ through our ABC/NE family. Palestine is #1 in total giving to Love Gift. It is #1 in per capita giving to United Mission. It is #1 in per capita giving to total American Baptist Mission Support.

In Love Gift, the congregation gives, per capita, more than four times what the #2 church gives. In United Mission, Palestine gives, per capita, 60% more than the #2 church.

From the beginning when Harriet Eliza Hanchett gathered family and neighbors in a sod house in 1879 to organize the church and Sunday School, Palestine Baptist has had a deep commitment to mission. From stories of filling missionary barrels with clothing for mission work in Omaha years ago, to vigorous support today of American Baptist mission work around the world, Palestine Baptist has always been about the Lord's business.



Strangers Rest Missionary Baptist Bellevue

Strangers Rest Missionary Baptist Church in Bellevue is one of the youngest churches in ABC/NE. Founded in 1998 as an outreach of Omaha's Salem Baptist by Rev. T. S. Gilliam, the church meets in a storefront location. The church focuses its efforts on outreach and the strengthening of each of its members in the faith. Revivals are an annual part of life at Strangers Rest.

Prior to planting Strangers Rest, Pastor Gilliam planted a church in Norfolk. It was there he met Frank Armstrong who was pastor at FBC, Norfolk. Armstrong encouraged him to consider becoming a part of American Baptist life. It took a few years but Pastor Gilliam decided affiliation with the ABC family was a positive step and Strangers Rest entered ABC/NE.

It is a particular joy to the church that one of their members, Rev. Dylan Young has not only been ordained by the local church but has been through the process of ABC recognition of his ordination administered by the ABC/NE Dept. of Professional Ministry. Rev. Young attended the Orientation to ABC Life Conference at Green Lake last October. He was honored at a special service of recognition of ordination held at Parkside Baptist in March.

Pastor Gilliam refers to the congregation as the CIA—"church in action." He says, "We're small but powerful!" Currently the church is engaged in Operation PAW. From seeing a lion on Discovery Channel, the church liked the image of disciples who are Practicing, Anointed and Witnessing, gently drawing in others. Gilliam says, "I say "anointed" because we can't do this ministry without the Holy Spirit." Amen!

First Baptist Church Chadron, NE

Located in the beautiful northwestern corner of Nebraska, First Baptist of Chadron has been ministering in its community since 1887.

The main church building is located within walking distance of Chadron State College. The church has frequently during its history been a place of spiritual development for college students. This history is being given new life by a new Bible study group. Recently the church began a ministry for college age students that includes a weekly Bible Study and a home cooked meal.

The men of the church have started a new men's group called "Building Men of Faith."

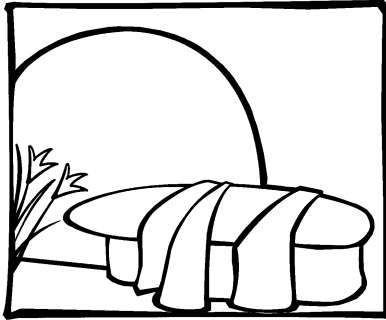
The women have added a group called S.O.S. (Serving others sacrificially by Serving our Savior) that is undertaking a mission outreach project every month.

Pastor Brad Daniels writes, "God is moving in mighty ways here in Chadron and the excitement level among the people here is ever increasing. We are truly looking forward to the next great thing God is going to do through us."

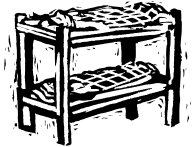
