

What Is God Up To Now?

[This month's guest columnist for the "From the Executive Minister" is Rev. Paul Marine, our Executive Minister's pastor and a member of the Region's Personnel Committee. Susan will return from her sabbatical in time for our next issue.]

"Do you think it's the end of the world?", queried my brother during a recent phone conversation. We had been discussing the numerous wildfires burning in California and the recent frequency of Midwestern storms. When we consider the fires, cyclones, tsunamis, earthquakes, tornadoes and floods currently in the news it causes one to wonder, is it the end of the world?

Our conversation wandered to the global scene where we thought a new group of displaced or persecuted people seemed to be identified every day. From Sudan and Somalia all the way to Myanmar and Indonesia people are targeted for elimination based on their race or faith. Is it the end of the world?

Having lost thousands on his recent home purchase and stock investments, it didn't take long for us to begin to bemoan the current state of the US economy. Now it seems the troubles are spreading abroad. With worry in his voice he asked again, "Is it the end of the world?"

The end of the world is a very difficult thing to predict. People have been doing it for centuries without any success. Even biblical scholars examine the scriptures in an effort to predict the end, but most of their efforts have fallen short.

In our recent study of the Gospel of John, the folks at Benson

Baptist have discovered Jesus' ministry to be one of creation and new beginnings. When I look around at what is happening in the world, I could get discouraged. Instead I wonder, what is God up to now?

With the economy in a slump, a young couple I know have been able to start their married life with the purchase of their own home; what an opportunity! Following recent weather disasters in our area, I have seen neighbors helping neighbors in a way you don't get to witness too much in today's world of isolation. Refugees keep coming to America (Canada, Australia, etc.) finding new opportunities they would never have realized in their country of origin: new beginnings, new freedoms, new opportunities to help those left behind.

We can't predict the end of the world, but we can look for where God is at work...and join him there! As I look around at our Nebraska ABC family I see many reasons to rejoice and get involved. Our churches are busy with; the AB Men's Trailer, building a church in Sudan, sponsoring refugees in our communities, feeding the hungry, teaching children about God, and expanding the ministries of Moses Merrill Camps and Conference Center. And this is just the short list of what we're doing!

Look around you at all that is going on. Is it the end of the world? I don't think so. In a way...it's creation...it's new beginnings.

Disasters Bring Opportunities For Service

What an exit from Spring and an entrance of the summer sea- washer, and cleaning supplies. son! The American Baptist Men's Disaster Relief Trailer has been very busy in the last couple of months.

What is the American Baptist Men's disaster trailer?

The trailer is a ministry of the ABMen. It carries equipment and tools to help in times of disasters. When called upon, the trailer and manpower is sent into an affected area to assist in meeting the immediate needs. The manpower is all volunteers. The trailer is funded by donations. The items in the trailer are: chain saws, water pumps, pressure washer, halogen lighting, generators, hand tools, clean-up buckets for homes, and safety equipment.

Where, what, when, and how has it been used lately?

This year the trailer started it's storm season in the Kearney, Lexington, and Cozad communities when a tornado came into the area. The disaster trailer was called upon to assist for a short while in this local disaster.

The trailer was moved a few days later to the Omaha area to respond to flooding issues in Douglas County. While parked at Sunset Hills Baptist Church, Omaha was struck by what many have called a "mid-west hurricane". The following morning we had chainsaw crews and generators dispatched.

The following day it was called upon yet again, by the Douglas County Emergency Management Agency, to assist with the devastation in the King's Lake area. A crew of six men helped free trees from downed power lines and make clear paths for the power companies to come and reestablish power.

The next day ABMen moved the trailer into the Valley area to lend assistance and to make available water pumps, power

What can I do to help?

The ABMen want all of the ABC brothers and sisters in the faith to know they need your assistance. We never know when or where a disaster will strike. The ABMen Disaster Trailer can be called to assist anywhere in Nebraska during local or state-wide disasters. The region office receives calls from pastors asking for assistance in times of need for churches, or when families are in need. Agencies are aware of our ministry as well and will at times call upon us for assistance when city, county, or state governments need assistance from outside sources.

The ABMen need to be ready with all volunteer contact information collected into a data base so we can reach those willing to help when the need arises. Will you help?

ALL volunteers can be men or women that are able and willing to serve, short term, in their area (western, central, eastern parts of the state). Needs can be met by all types of volunteers.

Tasks may include: cleaning flood damage, pumping/ vacuuming water, chainsaw crews, labor, putting together cleaning buckets for flood victims, power washing, relocating equipment (generators, pumps, etc.), team assistant (a humble servant), drivers that have a truck (must have 7,000 lb capacity)

If you are able and willing to assist in times of disaster please contact the region office and give your information and an ABMen Disaster Relief representative will contact you.

THANK YOU to the small band of faithful volunteers that put all their efforts into this last round of disastrous storms. You have helped and brought hope to many!


Moses Merrill Summer Staff Program Provides Opportunities for Ministry


